

1. How do I apply for Chicago Housing Authority (CHA) summer youth opportunities?

Applications must be completed online at https://youth.thecha.org/. The <u>online application</u> is available beginning Monday, March 13, 2017. Applications will be reviewed and participants selected based on applicant interests, program criteria and number of slots available. In order to complete the application, you will need:

- Client ID number (also known as the HCV Tenant ID/Voucher Number)
- Last 4 digits of Head of Household's Social Security Number (SSN)
- Applicant date of birth (DOB)

2. Who can participate in CHA paid summer youth opportunities?

To be eligible for CHA paid summer youth opportunities, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Be a Chicago Housing Authority resident or Housing Choice Voucher (formerly known as Section 8) tenant
- Have a CHA Client Identification Number
- Be between the ages of 13 24
 (Applicants must be at least 13 years old and no older than 24 years old by June 26th)
- Agree to participate in an interview, orientation and/or job readiness training

3. How do I know if I'm a CHA resident?

You are a CHA resident if you are included on a lease at one of the below mentioned Family, Mixed-Income, Scattered Site or Senior developments. (You may also view a list of these developments, by visiting http://www.thecha.org/residents/public-housing/). You are also a CHA resident if you are included on a lease and renting in the private market through the CHA's Housing Choice Voucher program (formerly known as Section 8).

4. What if I don't know my Client ID number?

The CHA Client ID Number (also known as the HCV Tenant ID/Voucher Number) can be found on your lease agreement, annual recertification form or other communications that you or your parent/guardian may have received from the Chicago Housing Authority. Check with your parent/guardian for this information or, in some cases, your Property Manager, FamilyWorks provider or HCV Satellite Office for assistance. The CHA Client ID Number is usually 4–7 numbers and may contain a letter at the beginning or end (e.g. n1111, 0000000t).

5. Can I complete the application from my mobile device?

It is highly recommended that you complete the CHA youth application from a desktop computer. Currently, the site is not optimized for smartphones and you may not be able to read or access certain application pages on your mobile device. If you do not have a desktop computer at home, you can reserve a computer at your local library. 6. How long does it take to complete the application?

The application takes around 30 minutes to complete. The session, however, will time out after 90 minutes of inactivity. Partial applications will not be saved and applicants must start over at the homepage.

7. What types of opportunities are available?

Summer opportunities include, but are not limited to, academic and career exploration programs as well as work experiences in government agencies, hospitals, nonprofits, small businesses, museums and retail organizations.



8. Is there a deadline to apply?

The deadline to submit an application varies by program selection:

9. I'm on the Summer Youth Opportunities page and some of the programs are greyed out. How can I select those programs?

Some paid summer youth opportunities will appear greyed out and cannot be selected because of the applicant's age and/or grade in school. Each program has specific age or grade requirements, which are listed on the application under the program name. Please remember that applicants must meet the age requirement by June 26, 2017. **Note:** Applicants may choose up to three opportunities and rank preferred programs by entering the numbers 1, 2, and/or 3 in the boxes next to the program name.

10. Does the application require an essay and what are the specific essay topics?

We want to get to know you as well as possible through the application. The essay response is an important part of the selection process as it helps us to learn more about you in your own words and gain insight into your personality and goals. Depending on your program selection, we ask that you respond to the topics below. Your responses should be a minimum of 150 words and no longer than 825 words.

Pick one person whom you admire for their leadership skills and write about the traits that make them special and how they have influenced you in some way.
STEM Camp	STEM stands for science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. What do you find most interesting about STEM? If you were selected for this opportunity, what do you hope to learn?
Summer Youth Employment Program (this essay is optional)	Write an essay explaining why a decision you made was the right one. (this essay is optional)

11. I was unable to print my application confirmation. How can I access this information?

Once your application is submitted, a summary of your program selections and recommended additional steps will show on the last page of the application with the option to print. You will also receive a confirmation email with the same information sent to the email address that you entered. Please keep this email for your records in case you need to contact us. If you do not receive the email in your inbox, check your SPAM filter and Junk mail folder.

12. I deleted my CHA Summer Youth Application Confirmation email. Can CHA resend it to me?

The CHA Summer Youth Application Confirmation email is automatically generated by our system and sent to the email address you entered on the Applicant Page. We do not save this email and cannot resend it to you. You may, however, contact us at (312) 786–6930 or by email at youthopportunities@thecha.org and we can look up your application information.



13. How much will I get paid and when?

Typically, participants in CHA summer youth opportunities can earn between \$600 and \$1155, based on age and attendance. Stipend or hourly wage amounts for each program can be found at https://youth.thecha.org.

Payment dates vary depending on your program selection. Typically, participants receive a check twice during the program with half the stipend paid mid—way through the program and the other half of the stipend paid after the program is over. If you are offered a slot in a summer program, you will receive more detailed information about specific pay dates.

14. Do I get paid for holidays?

You will only be paid for the hours actually worked or in programming. If you work on a holiday, you will be paid your hourly wage.

15. How will I know if I've been selected?

You should know by June if you have been selected to interview or attend an orientation for a summer opportunity. To be notified, it's important that you include a valid email address and current phone number. Only youth selected for a program will be contacted.

16. What else is there to do this summer?

The Chicago Housing Authority receives a large number of applications for a limited amount of opportunities each year. In addition to applying to CHA opportunities, we encourage you to take part in these other summer programs:

- Mayor Rahm Emanuel's One Summer Chicago brings together government institutions, community-based organizations and companies to offer over 25,000 employment and internship opportunities to youth and young adults ages 14 to 24. To learn more or apply, visit onesummerchicago.org
- Be Payday Ready! This summer, you will have access to the LRNG website, where you can complete a series of online activities (called a Playlist) to help you make the most of your paycheck. You will learn financial tips and tricks to manage your money and save for the future. When you successfully complete the Be Payday Ready Playlist, you will earn a digital badge, which is like a digital certificate to represent a learning achievement. When you earn the badge, you will have a chance to apply for financial education scholarships and win prizes. Check it out at lrngcha.org.

 Games, designing + Making, Performance, Sports + Wellness and Storytelling. You can
